

JOHN LIDDARD – TIMBER TRADE AND WAR VETERAN

John Liddard was born in Stepney in the heart of London's East End in March, 1924. After completing education in a local school, he left to find work at the age of 14, which at that time was quite the norm. In his early working days he had a variety of jobs and at 19 he was called up to The Royal Artillery where he trained at Fort William in Scotland. D-Day in June 1944 was for him a defining moment in his life as together with his army mates he was towed in a barge to land on Sword beach in Normandy.

He landed, but sadly lost close comrades and after a few days returned to the beach to see the carnage, a memory which remains with him. After many months his unit arrived in Germany and it was in a field near to Munster that he was shot in the hand by a sniper. The doctors said he would not be able to use the hand again but thankfully he defied all the odds.

After the war he found employment with Durells Ltd who were wooden packing case makers in Mile End, London and where he remained for many years until the company moved to Essex. John then joined East London Packing Cases, a similar timber-based business before joining

Roeding Sawmills where he stayed until his retirement at the age of 65.

He married his wife Connie in 1950 and they had a son and daughter. Connie died nine years ago and since then John has lived on his own for the most part, looking after himself with a determination to retain his independence. Until recent years he was still going to see his beloved Chelsea who he has supported since childhood!

This remarkable and modest man who celebrated his 100th birthday in March this year is a fine example of his generation who experienced so much and gave so much to his country.

John has been a TTBS beneficiary for many years and is a perfect example of how our organisation can help. He has said that our contributions are making a considerable difference to his daily life.

We would not be able to provide this support without the generosity of our many volunteers and supporters.
